- 2. What are you picturing in your head when you read?
- 3. Would you recommend this book to a friend? Why or why not?
- 4. Tell me what you read in two or three sentences.
- 5. Pretend you are the character and read 3-4 sentences like he/she would say them?
- 6. What kind of a person is the main character? (kind, generous, lonely, brave, etc...)
- 7. Would you want to be friends with the main character? Why or why not?
- 8. Would you like to read more books by this author? Why or why not?
- 9. Have your child make connections.
 - Have they ever shared an experience similar to the main character?
 If so, discuss it with an adult.
 - o Have they ever read another story similar to this story? If so, discuss it with an adult.
